

Class of 2014 Commends...

VALEDICTORIAN Allen Judd

Allen Judd, the Valedictorian for the Class of 2014, has consistently proven to be a top student who has talent in many other areas. Allen's near-flawless transcript, which includes nine Advanced Placement courses, and membership in the National Honor Society reflect his dedication to his school work. Allen has been a member of the Soccer, Cross Country, Indoor Track and Tennis teams at AC; serving as tennis captain since he was a sophomore and earning CCL All-Star and MVP Awards in tennis as well. He is also a member of the Science Team, Model UN, SADD, and was a member of the 2014 Yearbook staff. Allen was recognized for numerous awards at the awards ceremony, including medals in National Latin and Roman exams, and for being a National Merit Commended Student. Allen intends to study at Harvard University in the fall.



Allen's Commencement Address began with the mindset that everything in the universe is connected to everything else and that communities are "held together by the intense bonds" between the members

Connor O'Brien, the Salutatorian for the Class of 2014, has maintained an excellent academic record while also participating in many aspects of high school life. Connor was a member of many clubs at AC: the National Honor Society Spanish National Honor Society; the Model United Nations; and Spanish/World Language Club to name a few. Like Allen, Connor was also a National Merit Commended Student. He was also elected by his peers to the Student Senate three times and served as a junior class representative. Baccalaureate Mass & Awards Ceremony


On Wednesday, May 21, the Arlington Catholic High School community gathered to celebrate Mass and the achievements of the Class of 2014.

Commencement



On Friday, May 23rd, just under 2,000 people came together at the Dana Athletic Center at Bentley University to celebrate the Class of 2014. In addition to the Class of 2014, we also celebrated the Class of 1964. The Class of 64 was AC's first graduating class and were invited to lead the students in the procession.

Principal Stephen Biagioni began the afternoon, welcoming family and friends of the graduates; this was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance, led by Hannah Doyon, Senior Class Vice President. Following an invocation, led by Pastor Father Brian Flatley, Presley Silva shared opening remarks with the audience. Salutatorian, Connor O'Brien took the stage and reflected on the past four years. Allen Judd, the Valedictorian, talked about the bonds that we all share. Serge Clivio '13 returned to commencement to lead us in song.

John Carroll, a member of the Class of 1964 served as Commencement Speaker, offering sage advice to the Class of 2014. John was the first student president at Arlington Catholic High School as well as the first Football Captain at AC, along with his classmates, Steve Boeri '64 and Joe Beasley '64. After leaving AC, John went on to receive a BA from Boston College, where he played on the football team for two years. He then served on active duty in the US Navy until 1971, and on reserve duty until 1976. During that time, he received a JD from Boston University School of Law. John has been a trial lawyer since passing the Bar in 1974. He became a lawyer so that he could help people. At the beginning of his career, he worked on the Pine Ridge and Rosebud Indian Reservations as a staff attorney and considered that experience "lifealtering." Because of that experience, and his twenty years of Catholic education, John has continued to use his skills to help people through pro-bono work through the Boston Bar Association's Volunteer Lawyers Project and the Catholic Lawyers Guild's Saint Francis House. He is also on the Board of Directors of Greater Boston Legal Services and a part of the Massachusetts Bar Association's Judicial Administration Section Council and Individual Rights and Responsibilities Section Council.

In 2008, John received the President's Award from the Massachusetts Bar Foundation. In 2010, he became the MBA's representative on the Equal Justice Coalition and currently serves as the Chair. He is a lawyer member of



the Commission of Judicial Conduct. He has also been named a "Super Lawyer" by his peers several years in a row.

John's Commencement Address recognized the pioneering work of Monsignor Oscar O'Gorman and the Sisters of Saint Joseph as well as the hard work of the Class of 2014, recognizing many of their accomplishments.

Following John's address to the audience, the students received their diplomas, and Principal Steve Biagioni's commissioning of graduates ended another successful graduation here at Arlington Catholic.











COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER EXCERPT by John Carroll

Such a humbling and joyful honor – yet I am mindful of my place. The most memorable commencement speaker I ever recall was Queen Noor of Jordan, who addressed the BC commencement in the mid-nineties. She said, "A commencement speaker is a bit like the corpse at a wake. Everyone expects to see one but no one expects to hear much." I know my place is a brief interlude between the honors and the celebration, so I will be brief.

You are the blossoming of seeds planted 50 years ago. The sower of these seeds was Monsignor Oscar O'Gorman. Emerson once said that every significant institution is but the lengthened shadow of just one man. All that AC has come to be is attributable to the vision of Msgr. O'Gorman.

As an altar boy at St. Agnes and ACH for 6 years, I had the privilege of knowing him better than some. He was gruff and blunt. But he was a far-seeing, benevolent soul, with a superb intellect (Harvard Grad), and a superb administrator. In 1960, reputedly, St. Agnes was the 2nd largest and one of the most prosperous parishes in the Archdiocese

(so much so that St. Eulalias was carved out of it in 1966). Cardinal Cushing was an annual visitor. He knew where the money was. Msgr.

O'Gorman raised much money for the Cardinal's various charities.

During Msgr. O'Gorman's tenure he founded Fidelity House – a stroke of genius as the baby boom was producing kids at a rate not seen before or since. He gave them a place to romp safely.

He was the moving force in the establishment of ACH in 1960. He staffed it with the best nuns the sisters of St. Joseph's had: Melania, Corita, Marie De Lourdes, Mary, Agnes, Francis Agnes, Madelaine Marie, Joseph Marie, Ethelwald and Ronan, to name but a few. And of course, our first chaplains: Fathers Casey and Bullock.

He hired the best coaches: Dick Broderick in basketball and baseball, Bill Formosi in football, Jack Carney in hockey.

And he set a high standard for admissions. We were the first class, and, for four years the most senior class. We were few (142) and together for a long time. That experience forged bonds of a lifetime. We were pampered and pushed and the unspoken expectation was that we were seedlings that, over time, would yield a rich harvest.

As grapes are not gathered from thorn bushes, or figs from thistles, by their fruits you will know them. And, I will add, you will know their seed. We were the seedlings, you are the fruit. By your accomplishments, and those of the 48 classes in between, you fulfill the expectations the founder had for all of us. Would that Monsignor O'Gorman and the first staff were present to look out over the rich harvest I see today.

We all are the lucky few. Our family, our faith and our teachers have instilled values above and beyond mere knowledge: gratitude, compassion and love. They have given us the credentials to make a material living in life — but the ones who make a true difference in the world are not the ones with the credentials, but the ones with the concern for others. You have both.

Thank you for giving us a place of honor at your commencement. I leave you with a Franciscan blessing: May God bless you with the foolishness to think you can make a difference in the world, so you will do things which others tell you cannot be done.

Congratulations, well done, now go celebrate!

Arlington Catholic implements new program for technology in the classroom.

Arlington Catholic recognizes that our students live in a digital world and that we have an obligation to help students learn to use that digital technology properly as part of the learning process. With this in mind, we have made the decision to incorporate iPads in the classroom to integrate digital experiences into the curriculum with the goal of enhancing student learning through the use of technology as an educational tool. We plan to enhance and heighten the learning experiences of our students, in and out of the classroom. Even though there are many choices for devices, AC decided that the iPad was the best decision for what we hope to accomplish. Students will have the option of bringing their own iPad next year, with all students being required to have a device in the 2015-2016 school year.

By incorporating digital literacy into the curriculum,

students will be better prepared for life-long learning outside of school. Teachers envision greater student collaboration on projects and more in-depth research using the internet; skills that will serve students well in their lives. Students will have the ability to download many textbooks to their iPad, making greater use of their texts in class while also having the ability to link to a variety of supplemental resources right from the text. The value of having all of a student's notes with them at all times will also keep them more organized and productive in class.

Use of iPads, both those provided on school carts and student's own devices, promise to keep us and our students on the cutting edge while maintaining the solid academic base that has made Arlington Catholic so successful academically for the past 50 plus years.


Science Team







THIRD TRIP TO THE GARDEN


